3. Examine the punctuation, rhythm and diction of stanzas three and four. What do these stylistic elements reveal about the speaker's state of mind? (12 marks)
4. Examine the link between stanza one and the closing stanza. Has the speaker achieved a sense of understanding or relief? (8 marks)
5. Explore some parallels or differences between Hardy's poem and the war poetry of Wilfred Owen. (8 marks)
