Glossary

- I.7 **fed**: police
- I.12, I.22, I.24: **Black holes** are formed when stars run out of the fuel that powers them. These large stars explode in an event known as a **supernova**, before creating a black hole.
- 1.17 to cast lots: to decide something by picking an item, often a slip of paper, at random
