<u>Note on the poet</u>: Matthew Olzmann is a contemporary American poet born in Detroit, Michigan. He currently teaches at Dartmouth College, and the MFA program at Warren Wilson College.

Glossary:

the thylacine = the native Tasmanian wolf or 'zebra-wolf'

doodles = patterns that you draw casually onto something when you are bored
